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Export Certificate Report

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Report Highlights:

This FAIRS report lists the export certificates required for food and agricultural products shipped to the Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan. An export certificate matrix is included in this report. The requirements listed herein are specific for consignments coming directly from the United States to Jordan or transshipped in a sealed container with invoices stating that Jordan is the destination.

Disclaimer:

This report is prepared by the USDA/ Foreign Agricultural Service, Office of Agricultural Affairs Amman for U.S. exporters of food and agricultural commodities. While every possible care was taken in the preparation of this report, information provided may not be completely accurate either because policies/regulations/directives have changed since its preparation, or because clear and consistent information was not available. Post highly recommends that U.S. exporters verify the full set of import requirements with their foreign customers, who are usually best equipped to research such matters with local authorities, before any products are shipped.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The Ministry of Agriculture regulates unprocessed agricultural products, including the import of veterinary drugs and animal vaccines, pesticides, meat and meat products, poultry and poultry products, animal feeds, and seedlings.

[The Jordan Standards and Metrology Organization](#) (JSMO) is responsible for the development of standards and ensuring conformity with existing product standards. The JSMO delegates product testing responsibilities for food and agricultural products to the Jordan Food and Drug Administration (JFDA). However, the former continues to retain responsibility for the development of standards (including for food) and ensuring conformity with standards. Any consignment not meeting the official standard is subject to rejection; if so, it will require re-export or destruction at the importer's expense

The United States and Jordan continue to benefit from an extensive economic partnership. A key element of this relationship is the U.S.-Jordan Free Trade Agreement (FTA), which entered into force on December 17, 2001, and began implementation on January 1, 2010. However, the U.S.-Jordan FTA no longer provides a tariff advantage for U.S.-origin bulk agricultural commodities, including corn, as all origin corn imports are tariff exempt. Argentina and Brazil currently supply over 90 percent of all bulk corn imports.

Jordan's multitude of FTAs has created a vehicle for both domestic economic development and greater integration within the global economy. In 2002, Jordan signed an economic association agreement with the European Union (EU), paving the way for more liberal movements of capital between the EU and the kingdom.

Exports of U.S. food and agricultural products to Jordan in calendar year (CY) 2022 (January-September) were \$153 million, 9 percent down compared to the same period in 2021(\$167.5 m). This can be attributed to inflation, shortage of supply in the U.S. and economic hardship in Jordan.

GE Content Labeling: In February 2020, Jordan’s adopted a new regulation that legalize the imported consumer-oriented food products labeled as “containing” or “may contain” components derived from genetic engineering. The regulation ended a restriction on the importation of products that are labeled as containing GE ingredients. 11

Inspection and Testing: All food and agricultural imports are subject to inspection and testing to ensure that they are fit for human consumption. Jordan tests nearly all prepared and mixed food items at the border. Products failing to meet the corresponding standard, or found unfit for human consumption, may not be distributed and are subject to destruction. 11

SECTION V – OTHER CERTIFICATION/ACCREDITATION REQUIREMENTS TO ENSURE MARKET ENTRY 11

Customs Law No. 114 (2004): Jordanian and foreign trading companies must obtain an importer card from the Ministry of Industry, Trade and Supply for customs clearance purposes. Foreign companies not domiciled in Jordan are exempt from this requirement. Bonded goods, temporary imports, and imports entering under the provisions of Jordan’s Investment Promotion Law do not require import licenses. Banks and other non-trading entities such as hospitals, hotels, and Jordanian ministries must obtain a more limited MOITS importer card that authorizes the import of goods specific to the entity’s activities. 11

SECTION II – PURPOSE OF SPECIFIC EXPORT CERTIFICATES

See Section I, TABLE 1: List of Export Certificates Required by the Government of Jordan (MATRIX) for clarification of the specific purposes of certifications currently required by Jordan.

[The Jordan Standards and Metrology Organization](#) (JSMO) is responsible for the development of standards and ensuring conformity with existing product standards. It delegates to the Jordan Food and Drug Administration (JFDA) product testing responsibilities for food and agricultural products. However, the former continues to retain responsibility for the development of standards (including for food) and ensuring conformity with standards. The Ministry of Agriculture (MOA) regulates unprocessed agricultural products, including the import of veterinary drugs and animal vaccines, pesticides, meat and meat products, animal feeds, and seedlings.

JSMO responsibilities include the national metrology system; it also grants (voluntary) quality marks and accredits testing and calibration laboratories.

Jordan maintains the ASYCUDA computerized customs clearance system. This platform simplifies customs clearance procedures. The [Ministry of Agriculture](#) along with the [Jordan Food and Drug Administration](#) and the [Jordan Customs Authority](#) form the border committee that inspects inbound food and agricultural product shipments.

SECTION III – SPECIAL ATTESTATIONS REQUIRED ON EXPORT CERTIFICATES

Export Certificate: Export certificates will vary according to the product. The certificate must indicate that the product is produced under a recognized process, ensuring its freedom from public health hazards. The certificate should also indicate that the product is sold for human consumption in the country of origin without restrictions (See <https://www.fda.gov/food/exporting-food-products-united-states/food-export-certificates>). State and/or local authorities, including local chambers of commerce in the same jurisdiction as the manufacturing facility, may issue the document. Should the product be packed/processed in the exporting country (i.e., the United States) but originate in another, the product's certificate of origin must indicate the initial production area information.

Meat and Meat Products, Poultry and Poultry Products: Exporters of animal products must work closely with their Jordanian importers, as well as check the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) – [Food Safety and Inspection Service \(FSIS\) Export Library](#) frequently for the latest updates – these requirements are subject to change and are strictly scrutinized by customs authorities.

A Certificate of Wholesomeness (FSIS 9060-5) must accompany each shipment. Additionally, for shipments of fresh/frozen poultry the following statement must be typed in the “Remarks” section of FSIS Form 9060-S):

"The poultry originates from a county which is free of OIE Listed poultry diseases."

"The poultry and poultry products were produced in accordance to the FSIS National Residue Program."

Slaughterhouse Credentialing

For U.S. producers seeking to export meat products to Jordan, their slaughterhouses must have the following credentials

- Slaughterhouse license certificate from the U.S. federal government.
- Registration code.
- Quality assurance certificate [ISO 22000](#) or HACCP.
- Halal Slaughter Observance certificate, from any Islamic Committees in that specific state.

Specific packaging, labeling, and shipping requirements exist for meat, poultry, and their products.

Islamic Slaughter Certification

Halal certification is required for export to Jordan. Halal certificates are issued by competent religious organizations in the country of origin, certifying that the shipment of beef, mutton, poultry, and their derivatives have been slaughtered according to Islamic rites and *sharia* laws. Certifying statements should note that all adequate precautions were taken to prevent contamination with non-halal products, and accordingly, the product is suitable for consumption by Muslims in any part of the world.

All federally inspected establishments are eligible to export to Jordan. If products are to be labeled "HALAL," the plant must be able to accommodate the Islamic requirements. The following is presented as information for the exporter. The USDA's Food Safety and Inspection Service is not responsible for certifying that products intended for export to Muslim countries meet appropriate requirements for religious slaughter.

Halal Slaughter Requirement

For U.S. producers seeking to export meat products to Jordan, they must meet the following certificate requirements:

- All meat and any product of animal origin for export to Jordan must be accompanied by a halal certificate, except for pork and pork products (which can never be halal).
- A halal certificate may be issued by an Islamic association/institution in the state where the slaughtering took place or by any nationally recognized Islamic association/institution.
- The halal certificate should be issued and signed by the approved and licensed Islamic center only, and each consignment should be accompanied by a halal certificate showing the date of slaughtering.

- The halal sign logo should be on the original label from the producing establishment in the country of origin for mass packaging (industrial use) and for each individual retail package. Any added label will not be acceptable.

SECTION IV – GOVERNMENT CERTIFICATE LEGAL ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

General Requirements:

[Jordan's Customs Law](#) (1998), [article 31 and amendments](#) establishes that all customs declarations must include the following (note: the Jordan Customs Authority reserves the right to request additional documentation):

- A maritime or airway bill of lading.
- A commercial invoice indicating the value, weight, and freight and insurance charges. All invoices require Jordanian diplomatic/consular approval. In the absence of Jordanian diplomatic/consular approval, Jordan's Customs Director is empowered to accept the country of export's chamber of commerce certification.
- Commercial invoices are required to describe the product in Arabic.
- A notarized certificate of origin issued by the competent authority in the export country. A value declaration form for shipments exceeding Jordan dinar (JOD) 2,000 (currently JOD 1.00 = ~\$1.41).

Import Licenses: Pre-import clearance is required for certain commodities. These products include fruits, vegetables, beef, poultry, fish, and eggs. Powdered milk used in industrial applications, as well as any food product making special dietary claims (i.e., infant formula, nutritional supplements, etc.) must obtain an import license. The Jordanian importer is responsible for obtaining the license from the appropriate ministry.

The Ministries of Agriculture (MOA), Industry, Trade and Supply (MOITS), and Health (MOH) all issue import licenses. MOA is responsible for issuing pre-import clearances for live animals, for fresh/chilled/frozen beef and beef products, as well as for embalmed wild animals, frozen animal semen, and milk products. MOITS oversees the issuing of pre-import clearances for barley, rice, wheat, flour, sugar, and corn. MOH issues pre-import clearances for medications and antibiotics, athletic food supplements, as well as for potassium bromide, food dyes, ice cream, and baby food, including infant formula.

The clearance, once obtained, acts as an import license. Import licenses normally have a validity of three months, unless otherwise stated. For trans-shipments, the import license is valid for two months. Import licenses for chilled meat are normally valid for only one month. The appeal of rejected shipments is permissible.

Jordan does not require the original import license at the time of product entry. It accepts photocopies or faxes for perishable items (e.g., beef and fruit consignments). Jordan's Customs Authority releases shipments, under bond, pending submission of original documentation. Multiple consignments are permitted using the same import license until its expiration date or quantity is filled.

MOA is currently enforcing a poultry quota. The ministry has established a quota system in 2019 that caps poultry imports (broilers) to 30,000 metric tons (MT), up from 18,000 MT, and to restrict poultry cuts to 18,000 metric tons. Post engaged with GOJ to ensure that U.S. origin is excluded from this measure.

Registration Requirements: A few specific products require registration prior to import to Jordan. Most notably, seeds for planting and products making special dietary claims require prior registration. Exporters are encouraged to work closely with Jordanian importers in fulfilling these requirements.

Exporters of dairy products are required to register their facilities with the Jordan FDA prior to shipment. This registration is a simple verification of the exporting firm's hazard analysis and critical control points (HACCP) certification. It requires that the Jordanian importer provide a copy of the exporter's HACCP certificate with a completed application to the Jordan Food and Drug Administration.

In 2017 the Ministry of Agriculture implemented the requirement that slaughterhouses to be registered with the corresponding national authority prior to export to Jordan. In the case of the United States, this is the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The registration is only required once per facility, though it is yet unclear for how long the registration remains valid.

Product Bans: Jordan occasionally bans imports of specific products due to sanitary or phytosanitary concerns. Importers and exporters alike should verify the most recent list of prohibited products prior to shipment. Beginning in January 2017, Jordan banned the use of partially hydrogenated oils (PHOs) in processed dairy products. Processed cheeses, or other products that replace milk fat with any other fat, must not use partially hydrogenated oils. Exporters are encouraged to mark clearly the oil used on any products that could potentially contain partially hydrogenated oils. New to market dairy products should expect an increased level of scrutiny by Jordanian customs officials.

The color tartrazine (E102) is no longer permissible in pickled preparations. This regulation is in line with the European Union (EU) and Codex *Alimentarius* (Codex) standards, Category 4.2.2 and 4.2.2.3 respectively.

Labeling Requirements: The Jordan Standards and Metrology Organization sets labeling requirements, which are straightforward. A statement of ingredients in order of preponderance is not required. All labels must be in Arabic; alternatively, an Arabic language stick-on label is acceptable. The label at minimum must contain:

- Product name.
- The manufacturer's name and address.
- Net weight.
- Fortifying matter (e.g., added vitamins and minerals to powdered milk).
- Lot number and a "use before" or "best by" date.

Jordan's labeling requirements do not include Recommended Daily Intake (RDIs) levels. Nutritional labeling nevertheless is mandatory for certain food categories (e.g., infant formula and food for dietary use). The "best before" standard replaced "shelf life" labeling.

The Jordan Standards and Metrology Organization will interpret "best before" as being the product's expiry date; the sale of no product is permissible beyond that date. Jordan will scrutinize product labels at border crossing points. Current legislation holds the importer accountable for a product's content as specified on the label. Jordanian officials will reject shipments due to labeling ambiguities and printing errors.

GE Content Labeling: In February 2020, Jordan's adopted a new regulation that legalize the imported consumer-oriented food products labeled as "containing" or "may contain" components derived from genetic engineering. The regulation ended a restriction on the importation of products that are labeled as containing GE ingredients.

Inspection and Testing: All food and agricultural imports are subject to inspection and testing to ensure that they are fit for human consumption. Jordan tests nearly all prepared and mixed food items at the border. Products failing to meet the corresponding standard, or found unfit for human consumption, may not be distributed and are subject to destruction.

Jordan has implemented amended standards for *salmonella* in meat and poultry products. Products found to contain pathogenic strains of *salmonella* are subject to rejection and destruction. New standards for contaminants in fish have also been implemented. The standards outline the maximum limits of infestation and foreign materials present in fish.

SECTION V – OTHER CERTIFICATION/ACCREDITATION REQUIREMENTS TO ENSURE MARKET ENTRY

Customs Law No. 114 (2004): Jordanian and foreign trading companies must obtain an importer card from the Ministry of Industry, Trade and Supply for customs clearance purposes. Foreign companies not domiciled in Jordan are exempt from this requirement. Bonded goods, temporary imports, and imports entering under the provisions of Jordan's Investment Promotion Law do not require import licenses. Banks and other non-trading entities such as hospitals, hotels, and Jordanian ministries must obtain a more limited MOITS importer card that authorizes the import of goods specific to the entity's activities.


Jordan launched its Customs Integrated Tariff System (CITS) in August 2005. The system allows importers to access import requirements, as well as evaluate tariff and trade agreement information.
