EGYPT'S AGRICULTURAL RECLAMATION PROJECT BOOSTED FROM 1 to 1.5

MILLION FEDDANS: A project to reclaim land in Egypt's Western Desert has been expanded to one and half million feddans (630,000 ha) of prospective agricultural land instead of one million feddans (420,000 ha). The project includes digging over five thousand water wells for a total cost of LE6 billion (\$766 million), supplying 80 percent of what will be used for irrigation, while the remaining 20 percent will come from the Nile River. The project is to be implemented in stages, with the initial phase covering 220,000 feddans (92,400 ha). Egypt has a total cultivated area of 8.6 million feddans (3.6 million ha), including the 2.1 million feddans of desert reclaimed land from 1984-2004. The agricultural sector constitutes 17 percent of Egypt's GDP.

ONE-STOP-SHOP AT EGYPT'S SEA PORTS: The Ministers of Transport, Finance and Trade announced the "Electronic Linkage" system, which will connect all the sea ports to a central database for custom and inspection procedures, reducing the clearance time for imported commodities and products from 6 days to 4 hours. The Ministry of Transport said that they began applying the linkage system which they anticipate will be fully applied by the end of November 2015, noting that the first stage includes the Port of Alexandria.

EGYPT AND RUSSIA CONSIDERING BARTERING GOODS: Egypt's Minister of Industry and Foreign Trade stated that Cairo and Moscow could benefit from bartering goods. He added that there is huge potential for Egypt to export leather products, furniture, readymade garments, and its world famous Egyptian cotton in return for Russian machinery, tools, heavy trucks, and agricultural equipment. In addition, this month, Egypt and Ukraine agreed on a barter deal by which Egypt will provide Ukraine with cotton in return for the latter's wheat.

EGYPT PLANS TO RAISE CROPS IN SUB-SAHARAN AFRICA: Amid Egypt's water scarcity, Cairo is forming agricultural alliances outside its borders. The efforts include sending Egyptian farmers to cultivate land in Sudan and Congo, agreeing to transfer their expertise to local farmers. Additionally, Egypt is considering the establishment of model farms for strategic crops in a number of countries including Mali, Niger and Zambia. The countries have abundant water and land resources, but lack proper agricultural development due to lack of funding and agricultural machinery in which Egypt expects to capitalize on to cover the food needs of Egyptian people.

TRADITIONAL BREAD MAKING GOING STRONG DESPITE THE SUBSIDIZED BREAD PROGRAM IN NEW VALLEY GOVERNORATE: Despite the introduction in late 2014 of the government's new subsidy program using smart cards in the New Valley governorate in Upper Egypt, many villagers continue their tradition of baking their own bread. This traditional way of baking has been passed down over many generations going back to Egypt's ancient civilization. To prepare this traditional bread, women must first mix flour and yeast and let it sit through the night. Once the dough is ready to bake it is cut in a circular shape and loaves are placed on special plates made out of materials from the surrounding environment, and left exposed to the sun to work its magic for one to two hours until each loaf is fully fermented. As soon as the fermentation process is finalized, loaves go into a special ovens made of clay and fueled by burning dried cattle dung.



US TRADE TO EGYPT INCREASES 20 PERCENT IN JUNE

For January to June 2015, the US exported about \$603 million in agricultural commodities and food products to Egypt, a month-to-month increase of 20 percent from May. Major categories include bulk commodities such as corn, soybeans, wheat, and cotton; followed by consumer oriented such as beef and beef products, dairy products, and tree nuts; and intermediate products such as animal feed, soybean meal, and vegetable oil.
